Approval of Master Service Agreements

Approval of a Contract Extension for Pole Attachment Application Management Services

The Board approved a contract extension with Davey Resource Group, Inc. for management of BTU's pole attachment permitting process.

Approval of a Right of Way Easement

The Board approved a right-of-way easement to allow construction access to Wellborn Special Utility District to bring water service to the BTU Backup Control Center.

Approval of a Regulatory Pass-Through Charge

The Board approved a specific regulatory pass-through charge for the Transmission Service Real-Time Market Power Supply customer class.





A NEW NATIONAL PASTIME?

Pickleball, a sport that combines elements of tennis, badminton, and ping-pong, is sweeping across the nation. With its simple rules and engaging gameplay, pickleball has quickly become a favorite pastime for many in Bryan, finding a home in the city's well-maintained parks and under the enthusiastic leadership of the Brazos Valley Pickleball Association (BVPA).

In the post-COVID pandemic resurgence of outdoor activities, pickleball has become familiar to most Americans. However, its birth occurred in 1965 when Washington State Congressman, Joel Pritchard and businessman Bill Bell, set up a makeshift game on a badminton court using ping-pong paddles and a plastic ball. Two years later the first pickleball court was constructed near Pritchard's home. The sport grew primarily in Washington State and it wasn't until 1990 that pickleball had gained popularity in all 50 states. After slowly growing for decades, pickleball has been one of the fastest-growing sports in America since 2020.

The City of Bryan has fully embraced the pickleball craze, offering a variety of facilities for players to enjoy. With over 26 courts scattered across the city, players can choose from both indoor and outdoor options. The Bryan Tennis Center leads the way with 12 covered and lined pickleball courts, while Neal Recreation Center and Legends Event Center provide multiple air-conditioned indoor spaces for comfortable play. Outdoor courts are available at Austin's Colony Park, Bonham Park, Bryan Regional Athletic Complex, and Tiffany Park. Additionally, Schulman's Movie Bowl Grille, set to open in early 2025 at Travis Bryan Midtown Park, will feature both indoor and outdoor pickleball courts. This growing infrastructure is particularly significant as Bryan prepares to host the Texas Amateur Athletic Foundation's Summer Games of Texas in 2025 and 2026.

The park's courts are often bustling with players, from beginners learning the ropes to seasoned players refining their skills. Outdoor players can be found enjoying a game early in the morning or late in the evening, taking advantage of the cooler hours of the day. The accessibility of these parks has made it easy for Bryan residents to join in on the fun, whether they're seasoned athletes or just looking for a new way to stay active.

The Brazos Valley Pickleball Association (BVPA) has played a pivotal role in the sport's growth in Bryan. The group organizes regular games,

clinics, and tournaments, fostering a strong sense of community among players. BVPA's efforts go beyond just playing the game. They are focused on growing the sport and making it accessible to all. According to association president, Joe Hegwood, their mission is "to provide fun, fellowship, and fitness through the promotion and growth of pickleball in the Brazos Valley Community."

Austin's Colony Park

One of the reasons pickleball has taken off in Bryan is its appeal across all age groups. The sport's low-impact nature makes it ideal for older adults looking for a fun way to stay active, while its fast-paced gameplay attracts younger players seeking a new challenge. Families can often be seen playing together, enjoying the opportunity to engage in a shared activity.

Whether you're a novice or a competitive player, BVPA offers something for everyone. The association frequently hosts beginner clinics, where new players can learn the basics in a supportive environment. For those looking to take their game to the next level, BVPA offers advanced clinics and competitive play. It's this spirit of togetherness that has made pickleball more than just a sport in Bryan—it's become a key part of the community fabric. If you're interested in joining the pickleball movement in Bryan, there are plenty of opportunities to get started. At Bryan Texas Utilities (BTU), our mission is to provide safe, reliable, and efficient electrical service to our community. One key aspect of maintaining this service is our comprehensive tree trimming and vegetation management program. This initiative ensures that our power lines remain clear of obstructions, reducing the risk of outages and enhancing overall safety.

Why Tree Trimming is Essential

Trees are a vital part of our environment, offering shade, beauty, and improved air quality. However, when they grow too close to power lines, they can pose serious risks. Falling branches or trees during storms can damage power lines, leading to prolonged outages and potential safety hazards. Regular tree trimming helps prevent these issues by keeping vegetation at a safe distance from our infrastructure. BTU proactively clears the right-of-way to lessen the threat to system safety and reliability.

Our Tree Trimming Practices

BTU follows industry best practices for tree trimming, ensuring that we balance safety, reliability, and environmental care. Our skilled crews use specialized equipment and techniques to prune trees in a way that promotes healthy regrowth. We aim to create a safe clearance zone around power lines while preserving the natural beauty of our community. Some factors that determine the method of trimming include the branch structure, the position in the right-of-way, and the proximity of the lines. Industry accepted principles of proper arboriculture are practiced to prevent damage to trees. With nearly 2,100 miles of overhead transmission and distribution line to maintain, BTU has a 4-5 year "trim cycle" to ensure that we adequately trim vegetation throughout our entire service territory, which includes all of Brazos, and parts of Burleson, and Robertson counties. BTU employs a certified utility arborist that oversees all vegetation management activities. Prior to work beginning in your area, you will receive a door hanger on your front door, or gate, to inform you that crews will be on your property. A number will be provided should you have questions or concerns about their presence.







How You Can Help

While BTU takes care of vegetation management within the right-of-way, we encourage our customers to assist by maintaining trees and shrubs on their property, especially those outside the designated clearance area. Customers are responsible for maintaining the service line that connects to their home. Branches that contact the service line, also known as a "service drop", running from the utility pole to your meter are not pruned by our crews. At your request, BTU will disconnect the service line and move it clear of the limbs to allow you or your contractor to safely prune, or remove, the tree. Here are a few ways you can help mitigate vegetation issues:

Plant Wisely: When planting new trees, consider their mature height and distance from power lines. Choose species that will not grow too tall or wide and plant them far enough away from utility lines.

Regular Maintenance: Keep an eye on the trees and shrubs near your home. Regularly prune branches that are growing too close to power lines, but always prioritize safety and consider hiring a professional arborist for trees near electrical lines.

Be Safe: Never attempt to trim or remove trees near power lines yourself. This can be extremely dangerous. Always contact BTU or a professional tree service with experience in working near utilities.

Report Issues: If you notice trees or vegetation encroaching on power lines, report it to BTU. We will assess the situation and take appropriate action to ensure safety and reliability.



Our tree trimming and vegetation management program is a collaborative effort between BTU and the community. By working together, we can maintain a reliable power supply and preserve the natural beauty of our neighborhoods.
